CLARIFICATION OF GAITS

The following descriptions constitute the approved standard for performance of the required gaits in the various divisions of pleasure driving competition.

WALK

A free, regular and unconstrained walk of moderate extension is required. The horses should walk energetically but calmly, with even and determined steps.

SLOW TROT

The horse should maintain forward impulsion while showing submission to the bit. The trot is slower and more collected, but not to the degree required in the dressage collected trot. However, the horse should indicate willingness to be driven on the bit while maintaining a steady cadence.

WORKING TROT

This is the pace between the strong and the slow trot and more round than a strong trot. The horses go forward freely and straight; engaging the hind legs with full hock action; on a taut but light rein; the position being balanced and unconstrained. The steps should be as even as possible. The hind feet touch the ground in the footprints of the fore feet. The degree of energy and impulsion displayed at the working trot denotes clearly the degree of suppleness and balance of the horses.

STRONG TROT (Trot On)

This is a clear, but not excessive, increase in pace and lengthening of stride while remaining well balanced and showing appropriate lateral flexion on turns. Light contact to be maintained. Excessive speed will be penalized.

The term "trot on" should be used to call this gait.

HALT

Horse(s) and vehicle should be brought to a complete square stop without abruptness or veering. At the halt, the horse(s) should stand attentive, motionless and straight, the weight evenly distributed over all four legs, and be ready to move off at the slightest indication from the Whip.

REIN BACK

Rein back is defined as backward movement in which the legs are raised and set down simultaneously in diagonal pairs with hind legs remaining well in line. To be performed in two parts: (1) The horse must move backward at least four steps in an unhurried manner with head flexed and straight, pushing the carriage back evenly in a straight line. The driver should use quiet aids and light contact. (2) Move forward willingly to former position using same quiet aids.

SHOW RULES

- 1. Under no condition should the bridle be removed from a horse or pony while it is still put to a vehicle. At no time should a horse or pony be left unattended while put to a vehicle. Doing so incurs elimination.
- 2. Entries close May 15, 2016. Post entries (postmarked after 5/15/16) will be accepted until June 1, 2015 with no additional fee but will not appear in the program. Post entries received after 6/1/15 will be accepted with a \$20 late entry fee (each horse and whip combination). There will be a \$25 fee for any check returned for insufficient funds. In the case of a horse or pony being entered and not exhibited, entry fees will be forfeited. Refunds will be made upon receipt of a Veterinarian's or Physician's certificate attesting to an illness or injury. The certificates must be received by the Show Secretary prior to the start of the show. Pre-show cancellations should be communicated to the Show Secretary as soon as possible.
- 3. The show committee reserves the right to combine or cancel classes or to adjust the time schedule.
- 4. To participate in a Novice class, the whip may not have previously won three blue ribbons in a driving show class. (Such class must have had four entries for a blue ribbon win to be counted.) The novice whip may not enter both the novice and open division classes. An equine may be driven in both the novice and open divisions.
- 5. A change of whip constitutes a new entry.
- 6. Whips or passengers under 18 years of age (as of the date of the show) will be required to wear an approved helmet.
- 7. A knowledgeable adult must accompany whips under 14 years of age (as of the date of the show). No other passengers will be allowed.
- 8. The whip assumes full responsibility/liability for all passengers.
- 9. The use of a helmet by those over 18 is encouraged and will not be penalized.
- 10. Throughout the competition, the dress of the whip, passengers and grooms shall conform to the type of vehicle used. Driving aprons, hats, gloves and whip in hand are obligatory for whips. Period costumes are discouraged.
- 11. It is the responsibility of each competitor to insure that the harness and

vehicle are in good repair and structurally sound. In the interest of safety, it is essential that the harness and bridle be fitted properly to the horse or pony and that the vehicle is appropriate for the equine.

- 13. Cantering is not permitted anywhere on the show grounds or the road running next to the show grounds.
- 13. We encourage the use of wooden wheeled vehicles. However miniature horses may be shown to an appropriate wire wheeled vehicle. Antique wire spokes will be permitted at the discretion of the judge and show manager.
- 14. All dogs are to be on a leash.
- 15. The show officials will be on the lookout for unsafe conditions/situations. Any person who breaks any of the rules will be asked to leave the show grounds. NDS members are encouraged to also be on the lookout for unsafe conditions and report them to the show manager.
- 16. It is the responsibility of each whip to be on time for each of their classes. At the discretion of the show manager, the entrance gate will be closed to late arrivals. The entrance gate will temporarily be held open for whips that have notified the Paddock Marshall of unforeseen circumstances prior to the start of the class.
- 17. All of our classes are judged in accordance with the rules of the American Driving Society unless otherwise specified.
- 18. **Refunds:** Refunds will **not** be made due to class cancellations. If the show must be stopped due to weather or other emergency conditions, the show committee will suspend classes for 30 minutes. If the decision is made at that time to permanently cancel classes, refunds will not be made for the classes missed.
- 19. The owner, whip/rider takes full responsibility for the safety of any passengers in his/her vehicle. Whips, passengers and grooms must sign the release form included in the entry form.

PLEASURE DRIVING - WORKING DESCRIPTION WILL ALSO APPLY FOR THE NOVICE CLASSES - TROPHY AND SIX RIBBONS

A pleasure driving class in which entries are judged primarily on the suitability of the equine to provide a pleasant drive. To be shown both ways of the arena at a walk, slow trot, working trot, and a strong trot. To stand quietly on the rail and while lined up and to rein back. All entries chosen for a workout may be worked both ways of the arena at any gait requested by the judge. You also may be asked to execute a figure of eight and/or to perform other appropriate tests. To be judged: 70% on performance, manners and way of going of the equine, 20% on the condition and fit of harness and vehicle, 10% on neatness of attire.

PLEASURE DRIVING – REINSMANSHIP DESCRIPTION WILL ALSO APPLY FOR THE NOVICE CLASSES - TROPHY AND SIX RIBBONS

A pleasure driving class in which entries are judged primarily on the ability and skill of the driver. Equine is to be shown at a walk, slow trot, working trot, and a strong trot. Drivers shall be required to rein back. All entries chosen for a workout may be worked both ways of the arena at any gait requested by the judge. You also may be asked to execute a figure of eight and/or to perform other appropriate tests. The driver should be seated comfortably on the box so as to be relaxed and effective. Either the one or two-handed method of driving is acceptable. Common to both methods, the elbows and arms should be close to the body with an allowing but steady hand enabling a consistent "feel" with the equine's mouth. Drivers should not be penalized or rewarded for using one general style over another. In order to evaluate a driver's versatility, the judge may request a test involving driving with one hand. To be judged: 75% on handling of reins and whip, control, posture, and overall appearance of driver, 25% on the condition of harness and vehicle and neatness of attire.

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OBSTACLE DRIVING – TIMED OBSTACLES DESCRIPTION WILL ALSO APPLY FOR THE NOVICE CLASSES - TROPHY AND SIX RIBBONS

To be driven over a prescribed course consisting of no more than TEN obstacles. Faults on the course will be scored as penalty seconds. The winner will be determined by adding the penalty seconds incurred on the course to the time taken to complete the course. Ties for first place will be decided by a drive-off. Failure to carry a whip in an obstacle driving class incurs elimination. The required pace is a trot. Please note the course walk times on the schedule.

OBSTACLE DRIVING – GAMBLER'S CHOICE DESCRIPTION WILL ALSO APPLY FOR THE NOVICE CLASSES - TROPHY AND SIX RIBBONS

To be driven at the trot within a set time over a course of unnumbered obstacles each carrying a specific point value according to its degree of difficulty. Each driver has the same amount of time to negotiate as many obstacles and amass as high a score as possible within the time allowed. After passing thought the start, the driver may drive through the obstacles in any order, from any direction. Each obstacle may be driven twice for points, but not in succession. No points will be awarded for an incorrectly completed obstacle. If the horse should refuse or run out at an obstacle the driver may reattempt the obstacle or move on to another without penalty. The obstacle may be reattemped later. A signal will sound at the end of the allowed time and the driver must then exit through the finish where the total time will be recorded. If the signal sounds when the competitor is comitted to an obstacle, the competitor may complete the obstacle for points then go through the finish. Time will decide ties. If a tie occurs in both points and time, the winner will be decided by a drive off.

CONCOURS D' ELEGANCE

The essence of this award is the word "Elegance". The winner will be the turnout that, in the opinion of the Judge(s), presents the most consistent elegant effect. This will include the vehicle, harness, appointments, equine(s), the Whip, passengers, grooms, etc., but above all, general impression is most important. Vehicle and harness may be inspected to insure thoughtful restoration and careful maintenance. Attention will be paid to the personal appearance of the Whip, grooms, and passengers as it contributes to the overall picture. Performance will not be judged unless it detracts from the elegance of the turnout.

BEST SINGLE PLEASURE DRIVING TURNOUT

This trophy will be awarded to the single turnout demonstrating the best suitability to provide a safe and pleasant drive.

DIRECTIONS TO THE NORTHAMPTON DRIVING SOCIETY COMPETITION

From Western NY, take the NYS Thruway to Exit 47, Leroy. Follow signs to Rt. 19 North. Go through Bergen to Brockport. At major intersection turn right onto Rt. 31 East. Stay on Rt. 31 past traffic light at Rt. 260, go approximately 1.5 miles, and turn right onto Hubbell Road (South). Watch for signs.

From Eastern NY, take the NYS Thruway to Exit 46, Henrietta. Take Rt. 390 North (staying in 2 left lanes to remain on Rt. 390) until you come to Rt. 490 West (after Chili Ave. Exit) exiting Rt. 390 to the left onto Rt. 490 West. Take Rt. 490 West 1 mile (immediately getting into the right 2 lanes) to the Rt. 531 Extension, drive to the very end. Exit left onto Washington Street (Rt. 36 South); turn right at the caution light onto Colby St. At the first stop sign, turn right onto Hubbell Road. Watch for signs.

Northampton Driving Society, Inc.

The management of Springdale Farm, Monroe County Parks Department organized a carriage-driving event in June 1987 for the entertainment of the general Public. On September 17, 1987, a group of 13 people met to organize the drive for the following year. The **Northampton Driving Society** is an outgrowth of that effort.

The Northampton Driving Society (NDS) was formed to promote the equine sport of carriage driving. It was started with the novice whip in mind, but strives to reach all members equally.
